North Philadelphia, 19132

TimeLine

1870s

following the founding of the Fairmont Park Commission the establishment was named "Strawberry Mansion" in the 1870s. They took responsibility for the building and named it during the summer the family had stayed in that mansion. It become a popular destination for strawberries and cream at that time (Philly Skyline).

1890s

The area started to get really popular in the 1890s as migration from Northern Liberties and Fairmont started to happen rapidly. "many Jews took a left-hand turn and followed the trolley cars westward to (Strawberry Mansion)," (Meyers). Strawberry Mansion had an overwhelmingly Jewish population. there where at least 60,000 in its first years of the great migration.

1924s

"After an act of Congress in 1924 halted Jewish immigration, the neighborhood really flourished" (Macy). There were four 1st through 5th grade schools in strawberry mansion, but no high schools,nor any hospitals or police. But there were more then 60 businesses on 31st Street starting from Montgomery Avenue. Strawberry Mansion was a very traditional place and was always very live on the streets. Someone could play at Smith Playground, which was one of the first playgrounds in the nation, see a show on Oxford Avenue, and then go to the Robin Hood Dell to see a play.

Continued

1950s

After something called the white flight, the Brown v. Board of Education gave blacks more encouragement to take there place in Strawberry Mansion, and with the black migration came the economic decline of Strawberry Mansion.

2001

The Neighborhood Transformation Initiative was given an adequate budget of \$250 million to help restore declining neighborhoods; starting in Strawberry Mansion. The plan was to purchase abandoned lots and properties, knock down the houses and hope for developers to find some interest in the community as it was just being formed

2008

The program was eliminated due to failure of process. The neighborhood was not and up coming as they would have liked it to be so they cut the funds off. the money later on went to other services like the libraries and hospitals and thing like that. still helping out the community but stopped building the housing for the people coming in for year to come.

Now

A program similar was launched called the NSP 9Neighborhood Stabilization Program) which was hoping to accomplish the same thing as the last plan they had before by NTI and is managed by the Redevelopment Authority of Philadelphia. The Program had received \$16.8 million from federal support (the Department of Housing and Urban Development). And yet, clearly Strawberry Mansion hasn't made too much progress. The Little bit of housing they are building now are the same ones they have been working on for years.
