One of the few memories that the readers have heard of Offred's mother is of this protest she had gone to. The author described a world that would soon be turned into reality and it was interesting to see how the past aligned with the future. The protest was described as fighting for women rights for their bodies.

Offred's mother was shown as a big activist and was very feminine. She was described as different in the society that they were living in. In a way it sounded like the mom could be a lesbian. "I don't want a man around, what use are they except for ten seconds' worth of half babies. A man is just a woman's strategy for making other women." (pg. 121) I interpreted that she didn't like men, especially Offred's dad. She cared about herself and what she needed.

The color red was mentioned a few times in this section. The balloons were red and the author mentioned "The camera moves to the sky, where hundreds of balloons rise, trailing their strings: red balloons, with a circle painted on them, a circle with a stem like the stem of an apple, the stem of a cross."
