How to do it: Find an item around your house you don't mind "selling" for practice. Use your phone camera. Take photos in good lighting against a plain background from multiple angles. Practice close-ups of details and any "flaws."

7. Choose a Preliminary Business Name

Time Estimate: 15 minutes

Why it matters: Having a name, even a temporary one, makes your idea feel more real and gives you something to refer to.

How to do it: Brainstorm 3-5 names that fit your niche and sound appealing. Say them out loud. See if they're easy to remember. You can always change it later, but picking one now helps immensely.

Action Steps:

1. Complete the competitor research for at least one platform (eBay or Depop).
2. Write down your top 2-3 potential niches.
3. Snap some practice photos of one item you own.
